

Obtaining prerequisites for ASA 106 and Sail Canada Intermediate and Advanced Cruising

I. Coastal Navigation

ASA and Sail Canada have Coastal Navigation prerequisites that must be completed before you can be certified for Advanced. In addition, Sail Canada has a Coastal Navigation prerequisite for Sail Canada Intermediate.

ASA 105 Coastal Navigation

ASA 105 Coastal Navigation is a prerequisite for ASA 106 Advanced Cruising. You can meet this requirement by passing the 105 exam before coming to SVG, or you can write the 105 exam as part of your BOSS 106 course. However, there is not time in the 106 course to teach all of the 105 material, so you need to learn it ahead of time.

To meet the 105 requirement in advance of your BOSS 106 course, you therefore have two main options.

- 1. You may complete the ASA 105 course and write the exam with another ASA school before your BOSS 106 course. If you search online you will find a number of alternatives. Prices vary significantly.
- 2. Alternatively, there are various economical self-study options that can enable you to learn the ASA 105 material, and write the exam near the beginning of your BOSS 106 course. Self-study options include:
- The ASA Online Store (https://store.asa.com/asa-texts-and-reference-1.html) offers a various Coastal Navigation / ASA 105 resources.

- There are several ASA 105 training videos available on youTube
- Starpath sells an inexpensive training manual based on 1210TR: https://www.starpath.com/catalog/books/1979.htm. Starpath also provides several ways to get the related 1210TR training chart, including free PDF and BSB downloads, at https://www.starpath.com/1210tr
- Free PDF versions of training charts are available from NOAA at: https://historicalcharts.noaa.gov/historicals/search_attributes?type=Nautical%20Chart-Training
 - You can download a 42 mb version of the MARTHA'S VINEYARD TO BLOCK ISLAND SYMBOLS AND ABBREVIATIONS, Chart 1210TR which is the one used for the 105 exam and many of the courses. You could take the resulting file to a print shop and print it out at chart size. Alternatively, there are various online resources, including Starpath as noted above, that sell a full size paper version for <=\$10. Search online for "1210TR"

- Sail Canada Intermediate Coastal Navigation is a prerequisite for Sail Canada Advanced Cruising certification

2. VHF Radio

Prerequisites for Sail Canada Intermediate Coastal Cruising include the Marine VHF Restricted Operator Certificate (Maritime).
